# COLLEGE SEARCH & APPLICATION TIMELINE

## Junior Year

### January

- Decide what type of post-secondary education you are looking for (technical/career school, two-year college, four-year college, etc.)
- Consider the following factors: location, size, majors offered, social environment, cost, admission requirements, academic rigor, activities/clubs, sports, etc.
- Begin to prepare for SAT I/ACT tests. Attend free prep program at PHS, link PSAT scores to Khan Academy, and/or register for an SAT/ACT prep program through an outside agency (See Junior Planning Guide for list).

### February – April

- Begin seriously searching for post-secondary schools you might like to attend. Use Naviance, college search websites (see Junior Planning Guide), and college guidebooks (available in the Career Resource Center) as resource materials.
- Explore college websites online and attend sponsored college fairs (mini fair @PHS in March & National College Fair at the Meadowlands Exposition Center in April).
- Arrange to visit potential colleges during spring break – many schools will have open houses and tours during this time and you'll be able to see classes in session.
- Register for the SAT I (March, May, or June) at [www.collegeboard.org](http://www.collegeboard.org)
- An additional standardized test to consider taking is the ACT (April or June). Register on-line at [www.act.org](http://www.act.org)
- Students interested in attending one of the military academies should contact their U.S. Representative and U.S. Senators and express their desire to be nominated.
- Students interested in playing sports in college and who may qualify for an athletic scholarship should contact coaches at schools they're interested in.

### May

- Take the SAT I.
- Submit an NCAA Clearinghouse form on-line, at [www.eligibilitycenter.org](http://www.eligibilitycenter.org) if you intend to participate in college athletics. Go to [www.ncaastudent.org](http://www.ncaastudent.org) for more information.

### June

- Another chance to take the SAT I or ACT.
- If a potential school requires them, take the SAT II subject tests.

### July – August

- Continue to visit colleges during the summer.
- Try to narrow down your list to between 5 – 7 schools to which you will apply (your list should include a combination of reach, target, and safety schools).
- If you plan to apply for Early Decision, make a definite decision over the summer and prepare to submit your application very early in the school year.
- Register to take the SAT I's again in August/October.

## **Senior Year**

### **September**

- Meet with your school counselor to be sure that the colleges remaining on your list are appropriate to your academic and personal record.
- Review your high school transcript with your school counselor to check for accuracy of courses, grades, rank in class, etc.
- Attend Senior Parent Night.
- Request letters of recommendation from at least 2 teachers (ask in person first, then request through Naviance).
- Attend mini college fair in the media center.
- Plan visits to college campuses if you didn't get to them during the summer or if you want to return for a second time.
- Register online for the SAT, SAT II, and ACT subject tests.
- Start writing college essays.
- Set up your Common App account if applicable.

### **October**

- Attend Senior Seminar with your guidance counselor for information on application procedures.
- Attend Financial Aid Night.
- File the FAFSA online starting October 1st at [www.fafsa.gov](http://www.fafsa.gov).
- Attend local college fairs (ex. CCM) to further investigate those colleges to which you will probably apply.
- Finalize your list of colleges in Naviance.
- Prepare information needed for college applications (brag sheets, activity résumé, etc.).
- Send in Early Decision and Early Action applications.
- Make appointment with your counselor for a recommendation letter if required by any colleges.
- Turn in transcript request forms at least 2 weeks before your 1<sup>st</sup> deadline.
- Work hard, senior grades are important.
- Take SAT or ACT if necessary.

### **November**

- Nov. 1<sup>st</sup> & Nov. 15<sup>th</sup> are common Early Action/Early Decision deadlines
- Continue filing applications to colleges.
- Turn in transcript request forms for December deadlines.
- Request MP 1 grades be sent to EA/ED schools if required by the colleges.
- Take SAT if necessary.

### **December**

- If admitted to your ED school, withdraw applications from all other schools.
- Last chance to take SAT/ACT if necessary.
- Turn in transcript request forms for January deadlines.
- Receive Early Action/Early Decision I decisions.

## **January**

- Maintain a strong senior year.
- Begin applying for scholarships. Look under "Colleges" tab on Naviance.

## **February/March**

- Send mid-year reports if necessary.
- File last college applications.
- March 1<sup>st</sup> is final deadline for rolling admission schools.
- Review SAR (student aid report) carefully.
- Review financial aid packages.
- Keep grades up.
- Continue scholarship applications. Watch deadlines carefully.

## **April**

- Visit schools where accepted if necessary/Attend Accepted Student Days.
- Contact financial aid office if you have any special financial aid circumstances.
- If wait-listed, contact admissions office if you are still interested in attending.
- Make final decision and mail your deposit to one school by May 1<sup>st</sup>.

## **May**

- May 1<sup>st</sup> is National Deposit day.
- Contact colleges you have not selected to inform them that you plan to enroll elsewhere.
- Update college decisions on Naviance.
- Take AP Exams if applicable.

## **June**

- Request final transcript to be sent to the college you will attend.

# **10 Tips to Stay on Track between Now and Graduation**

1. Make a list of colleges to which you might apply and add them to your Naviance account.
2. Check websites for application instructions. Many schools now use the Common Application.
3. Compare colleges on the basis of programs, location, cost, environment, etc. Feel free to use the forms included in this booklet.
4. Make certain you meet college admission requirements. Check Scattergrams and admission information in Naviance.
5. Find out if any students from PHS have attended the colleges you are interested in and ask them for their impressions. (Ask your counselor)
6. Visit schools and take notes while you are there so you will have an accurate description of your reactions when you return home. Feel free to use the forms provided in this booklet.
7. For applications that require essays, write rough drafts and put them aside to review in the fall. Your English teacher would be the perfect person to look them over.
8. Make sure you have obtained a Social Security number.
9. Review financial concerns with your parents.
10. Begin putting together a list of all your activities in and out of school as well as volunteer work and part-time job experiences you've had. Check out the sample resume included in this booklet for ideas on how to set it up.

## Identify Important Factors in Choosing a College

In choosing a college, the first things you'll probably consider will be the **type of academic program** and the **availability of the major—or majors—you are most interested in.**

Here are some things to think about as you compare colleges. How you rank these other factors will depend largely on your personal preferences and needs.

## **ADMISSION TERMS YOU SHOULD KNOW**

**ACCREDITATION** – recognition by one of six accepted regional accrediting associations of a college’s ability to meet established standards of educational quality.

**ACT** - An aptitude test administered by American College Testing required in lieu of SAT by many colleges in the Midwest and South, and accepted more now in the Northeast; scored from low of 11 to high of 36.

**ADMISSIONS FOLDER** – The folder of materials which admission officers review in order to make admissions decisions on a particular student. The folder usually includes: the student’s completed application, the high school transcript, letters of recommendation, SAT scores and interview evaluations.

**ADVANCED PLACEMENT (AP) EXAMINATION** – Generally taken in May of the senior year to obtain advanced placement or college credit for course work taken in high school in a particular subject: 3 hour exams administered by CEEB scored on a scale of 1 (low) to 5 (high); scores of 3, 4, or 5 will generally earn advanced placement or advanced standing in college.

**ADVANCED STANDING** - College credit received by an incoming freshman (and applicable to the necessary credits required for graduation) accorded on the basis of a student’s performance on Advanced Placement Examinations: credit may also be granted for courses taken at an accredited college before matriculation.

**CLEARINGHOUSE** - NCAA Initial Eligibility – Determine eligibility for Division I and Division II athletes. Prospective athletes must complete Clearinghouse forms. See your counselor for information.

**CEEB** – College Entrance Examination Board: an agency located in Princeton, NJ which governs the administration and scoring of the SAT examinations. Each high school has a CEEB code number. PHS is 311-078; PHS is 311-079.

**CLASS RANK** – A student’s position in his class based on ranking of each student according to his/her grade point average. Colleges generally want to know whether a student ranks in the upper tenth or upper fifth etc. of his/her high school class.

**CLEP** – College Level Examination Program: five tests designed primarily for individuals who wish to obtain credit at some colleges by being tested on their knowledge acquired through life and work experience.

**COMMON APPLICATION** – A standard application adopted by more than 100 colleges permitting a student to complete just one application which can be photocopied and submitted to any college in the group.

**CSS** – College Scholarship Service analyzes the information you list on a Free Application For Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and estimates what you can pay toward college costs.

## **ADMISSION TERMS YOU SHOULD KNOW (cont'd)**

**DEFER** – A postponement of final action on an early decision candidate’s application when the college feels it is necessary to have more information on the student before reaching a final decision.

**DEFERRED APPLICATION** – A student, upon approval of the college admissions office, may defer his/her enrollment until a year after he/she has been admitted, provided that the student will not be attending another college in the U.S. and that the deposit fee has been made.

**EARLY ACTION** – A plan used by some colleges to inform applicants of acceptance, deferment, or rejection by mid-December; the applicant is not obligated to enroll if accepted and does not have to reply to the college until May 1<sup>st</sup>.

**EARLY ADMISSION** – A program of entry into college after the junior year of high school; available at most colleges to some high-ability, mature students.

**EARLY DECISION** – A student who is certain that a particular college is his/her first choice may apply to the chosen college by a specific date and must agree to enroll in that college if accepted on the early notification of mid-December; applications to other colleges must be withdrawn if a student receives an early decision acceptance.

**ETS** – Educational Testing Service: located in Princeton, NJ; researches and develops tests and other services administered by the CEEB.

**FAFSA** – Free Application for Federal Student Aid: Used by all colleges to provide financial information (such as assets, liabilities, special financial circumstances) necessary to determine whether a student has financial need. Deadlines must be strictly observed; information of FAFSA remains confidential. The FAFSA is completed online at <https://fafsa.ed.gov/>.

**FEE WAIVER** – An application fee may be waived for any student who requests it, provided the student’s counselor substantiates the need for the waiver.

**FINANCIAL AID** – A “financial package” is a combination of loan, job and/or scholarship aid; colleges vary greatly in their package.

**GPA** – Grade Point Average: the average of all grades in high school courses, usually rated from low of 1.0 for a “D” to 4.0 for an “A” unweighted or a 5.0 for an “A” weighted. Honors and Advanced Placement courses (are) “weighted” or given an extra point in computing GPA.

**MATRICULATION** – Actual enrollment of a student in a college as a degree candidate.

**NSSE** – National Survey of Student Engagement—Colleges do not publish this information but should give it to you if you ask. See [http://nsse.iub.edu/html/students\\_parents.cfm](http://nsse.iub.edu/html/students_parents.cfm) for more information.

## **ADMISSION TERMS YOU SHOULD KNOW (cont'd)**

**PSAT/NMSQT** – Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test: an objective test measuring certain developed verbal and mathematical abilities that have been shown to be related to success in college work. A shorter version of the SAT and an estimate of a student's probable performance on the SAT scores on the PSAT/NMSQT taken in October of the junior year in high school are used to determine commended students, semi-finalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program and the National Achievement Scholarship Program for Outstanding Black Students.

**ROLLING ADMISSIONS** – An admissions program used by many colleges whereby applications are reviewed as they are received and applicants are notified of admission decisions as soon as they are determined. No further applications are accepted once the admissions quota is reached.

**TRANSCRIPT** – The official copy of a student's academic record: includes a student's personal data, courses taken, grades received, accumulated grade point average, and rank in class.

**WAIT LIST** – A reserve of students considered suitable for enrollment in a particular college but not accepted initially; if sufficient numbers of accepted students do not enroll, a college admits students from its wait list.

## FAMILY CONNECTION BY NAVIANCE

Family Connection by Naviance is a comprehensive website that students and parents can use as a tool in planning for college. It is a web-based program designed to improve college and career planning and is a place to organize personal data, lay out a game plan, maintain a list of prospective colleges, and track the application process.

While we anticipate heaviest usage of this program among our juniors and seniors, many of our younger students and their parents will find this tool to be helpful in longer-term planning.

### To begin using Family Connection:

1. Go to PHS website.
2. Click on counseling tab.
3. Click on Naviance.
4. Click Naviance link.
5. Next to email, type in your PHS computer sign in (not full email).
6. For password, type in 1<sup>st</sup> initial of your first name in CAPS followed by the 1<sup>st</sup> initial of your last name in lowercase followed by your student number

### Features to Explore:

**Career Tab** – *“Personality type – Do What You Are”* assessment and *“Career Interest Profiler”* – students can match their personality and interests to specific careers and get valuable information regarding job descriptions, salaries, job outlook, education needed, and more.

**College Tab** – *“College Lookup”* – type in the name of a college and receive comprehensive information on admissions information, academics, cost, financial aid available, athletic programs, extracurricular offerings, as well as a link to each college’s own website. *“College Search”* – enter criteria such as size, location, cost, majors, etc., and a list of potential matches will be generated. *“Acceptance History”* – this feature shows all colleges to which PHS students have been accepted, as well as the number of students enrolled at each school. *“Scattergrams”* – a graphical view of application outcomes (accepted, denied, waitlisted) at a college for recent PHS applicants using GPA and SAT scores. Students can gauge their chances of acceptance by comparing personal GPA/SAT numbers with those displayed. *“College Overlap”* – students can see up to 10 more schools that are similar to the ones they are thinking about applying to. *“College Visit Schedule”* – students can click on Visit Schedule to see a list of scheduled visits by college representatives. Sign-ups still need to be done through the Career Resource Center. Under *“My Colleges”*, seniors can organize applications and track deadlines.

Other resources provided by Family Connections are links to useful websites relating to financial aid, test preparation, NCAA eligibility, etc. Naviance also allows students to create a resume, communicate with their counselor and receive emails from the Guidance Department.

## Questions to Ask on Your College Visit

### About Academics

1. What academic elements are considered in the admissions process, for example: courses, grades, test scores, rank, interests, institutional needs, essays, recommendations, and interviews? How important are each of these factors?
2. Which academic programs on campus are the most popular?
3. What are the largest classes you could have as a freshman or sophomore? How many large classes can you expect?
4. Who teaches the freshman classes? Teaching Assistants? Graduate Assistants?
5. (If this applies to you) Are there any special support services if you are a special needs students (ADD, ADHD, LD, etc)? How do these support services function and is there any additional cost charged for these services?
6. Is there an Honor Code? How does it operate?
7. Is there an Honors Program for talented students? How do you qualify?

### About Social/Recreational Opportunities

1. What activities do students participate in during their free time both on campus (school sponsored) and in the community?
2. Does the campus have a Greek system? If so, what percent of the student body participates in Greek life? Are parties open? How do students who elect not to participate in the Greek system fit in?
3. What are the most popular extracurricular activities?
4. Where is the central gathering place for students?
5. What portion of the student body lives on campus? What portion of the student body remains on campus for the weekends?
6. What transportation options are available to and from campus both for trips to the mall and for treks to transportation centers for trips home?
7. Can freshmen have cars on campus? What is the fee for having a car on campus?
8. Is it easy to get around campus? Can you walk to and from classes?



### **About Auxiliary Services**

1. Where do students go if they have a medical emergency?
2. What tutoring, counseling, and support services are available on campus and how are they accessed?
3. What computer access will you have? Do you need to bring your own computer? Are the dorms wired for Internet service?
4. What laundry facilities are available?
5. What are the safety issues on campus? How are they addressed? Ask for a crime report; federal law requires schools to provide safety information to students.
6. Are there on-going construction projects around campus? (This is a good thing as it signals good facilities.)

### **About Housing/Food Services**

1. Is campus housing guaranteed for all four years? What percent of students live on campus all four years?
2. What housing options exist? (Honors? Themed? Single-sex? Co-ed? Greek?)
3. What meal plans are available? Are freshmen required to purchase a specific type of meal plan?
4. What hours may students access food services?

### **About Paying For It**

1. What is the yearly cost of attendance, including books, tuition, fees, housing and meal plans? In other words, what is the all-inclusive cost?
2. Does your ability to pay the full cost of attendance have any impact on the college's decision to admit you?
3. Which financial aid forms are required? (The most common are the FAFSA and the CSS PROFILE, but some schools have institutional or school-specific forms and some states have special forms.)
4. What percent of entering freshmen receive aid? What was the average freshman aid package? Is there a way aid is packaged, loans first for example? If you are unhappy with your aid package, is it negotiable?
5. If you demonstrate need, will the school be able to prepare a financial aid package that will meet 100% of your demonstrated need?
6. What types of payment plans exist for paying the Estimated Family Contribution?



## **INTERVIEW GUIDELINES**

Not everyone will need to interview, but here are some helpful tips in case you do!

1. Call the admissions office to make an appointment for an interview.
2. The interviewer will be interested in the following things:
  - a. your promptness
  - b. your appearance
  - c. your manner
  - d. the way you speak
  - e. your degree of maturity
  - f. your special interests
  - g. your social attitudes
  - h. your enthusiasm
3. Prepare for the interview:
  - a. Make definite arrangements for the appointment by phone, letter, or email; check your transportation to make certain that you will arrive on time.
  - b. Read the catalogue/website carefully. Do not make the mistake of asking questions that are already answered in the catalogue/website. Don't hesitate, however, to ask follow-up questions if you need more information than the catalogue/website gives.
  - c. Be ready to speak on any points made in your application. Be consistent. Don't make any statements that contradict information you have already given.
  - d. Dress in good taste.
4. Be prepared to discuss possible topics such as:
  - a. A general description of your high school.
  - b. The competitiveness of your class.
  - c. Your most challenging course, your favorite course, your favorite teacher, a research paper or independent study, or an Advanced Placement course.
  - d. The kind of high school student you think you are.
  - e. What you hope to get out of college.
  - f. Why you think THIS college might be "right" for you.
  - g. Your co-curricular activities, athletics, hobbies, special interests, community service, and work experience.
  - h. Your level of performance and leadership.
5. The interview:
  - a. Keep in mind that this is a get-acquainted meeting. Speak up confidently and politely. React naturally; be alert and responsive. The interviewer will try to make you feel at ease. Smile, and if you have a sense of humor, use it!
  - b. Discuss, but don't argue. If you disagree with something said, be tactful and courteous.
  - c. If you don't know the answer, say so frankly.
  - d. You may be asked whether you are able to meet the expenses of the college.
  - e. Don't prolong the interview. Watch for a cue that it is about to end. When the interviewer extends his/her hand, stand up, shake hands, thank him/her for seeing you, and leave gracefully.
  - f. As soon as you get home, write a thank you note to your interviewer. (By hand. In pen.)

# Steps to Achieving NCAA Eligibility



## **FRESHMEN & SOPHOMORES**

- Work hard to earn the best grades possible.
- Most high schools have a List of NCAA Courses. Take classes that match your high school's List of NCAA Courses. The NCAA Eligibility Center will use only approved core courses to certify your initial academic eligibility.
- You can access and print your high school's List of NCAA Courses at [www.eligibilitycenter.org](http://www.eligibilitycenter.org). Click the NCAA College-Bound Student-Athlete link to enter and then navigate to the "Resources" tab and select "U.S. Students" where you will find the link for the List of NCAA Courses.
- At the beginning of your sophomore year, complete your online registration at [www.eligibilitycenter.org](http://www.eligibilitycenter.org).
- If you fall behind, do not take short cuts to recover credits. Classes you take must be four-year college preparatory and meet NCAA requirements to be used for initial academic eligibility.

## **JUNIORS**

- Register to take the ACT, SAT or both and use the NCAA Eligibility Center code "9999" as a score recipient to send your official score(s) directly to the NCAA Eligibility Center.
- Continue to take college preparatory courses. Double check to make sure the courses you have taken match your school's List of NCAA Courses.
- Ask your high school counselor to send an official transcript to the NCAA Eligibility Center after completing your junior year. If you have attended more than one high school, the NCAA Eligibility Center will need official transcripts from all high schools attended. The NCAA Eligibility Center does NOT accept faxed or emailed transcripts/test scores. However, the NCAA Eligibility Center accepts transcripts electronically through Parchment, Scrip Safe, ConnectEDU, National Transcript Center/Pearson Edustructure, USMO ET and Xap.
- Before registering for classes for your senior year, check with your high school counselor to determine the number of core courses you need to complete during your senior year.

## PHS College Application Process

The college application process can be exciting and overwhelming all at the same time. Remember, your counselors are here to help!

This booklet is loaded with important information about the college application process and will be a valuable resource in the upcoming months. In order to get you started, we have listed below a breakdown of responsibilities by student and counselor as well as some tips on how to stay organized using Naviance.

- Transcript
- School Profile
- Secondary School Reports (if included by student/Common App. Forms done electronically)
- Counselor letter of recommendation (if required)
- Mid-year and final transcript if requested



## NAVIANCE

### A Tool to Keep Track of your Applications

- Using COMMON APP? First you must create your account on [www.commonapp.org](http://www.commonapp.org), sign the FERPA and link your account with Naviance (using your common app username and password).
- Log into Naviance, which uses the same username and password as the school email/computers.
- Click on “Colleges” tab
- Select “Colleges I’m Applying To”
- Select “Add to list”
- Choose “Type of Application” - please make sure you specify how you are applying!
- Select “Lookup” in blue to find your school, click on the school, and add it to your list.
- Check “I have submitted my application” when you have done so
- Repeat for all schools

#### *Common Mistakes.....*

- Not linking your Common App to Naviance
- Not specifying how you are applying
- Forgetting to add all of the schools that you are applying to in Naviance

## Scholarship Procedures

Please check Naviance under “Scholarship List” for all scholarships that come to Guidance. Remember, any scholarship offered by a local organization usually guarantees someone from our school will win.

The deadline date listed on Naviance is the one that must be followed-**NOT** the date on the application. We need time to fill out the paperwork the organization requires from us as well as time to proofread all applications to make sure they are complete and arrive at the proper destination by their deadline date.

Please complete all parts of the application you can and then your counselor will fill out any forms they might need to in order to complete your application.

After application is completed, please paperclip the blue Scholarship Transcript Request Form to your packet and place in the basket in Guidance.

## College Information

The following statistics represent the number of students who applied to each college or university, the number of acceptances and the number of students who matriculated at each institution. Data is sorted alphabetically and includes the “Competitiveness Rating” (CR\*) developed by Barron’s Profiles of American Colleges. Barron’s has a unique yet respected and comprehensive system for comparing every school’s degree of admissions competitiveness. Colleges are rated from Most Competitive to Less Competitive and more. (Barron’s Educational Series, 2015.)

### Most Competitive

Even superior students will encounter a great deal of competition for admission to colleges in this category. In general, these colleges require high school rank in the top 10% to 20% and grade averages of A to B+. Median freshman test scores are generally between 655 and 800 on the SAT and 29 and above on the ACT. These colleges admit only a small number of those who apply—usually less than one third.

### Highly Competitive

Colleges in this group generally look for students with grade averages of B+ to B and accept most of their students from the top 20% to 35% of the high school class. Median freshman test scores generally range from 620-654 on the SAT and 27 or 28 on the ACT. These schools generally accept between one third and one half of their applicants.

### Very Competitive

The colleges in this category generally admit students whose averages are no less than B- and who rank in the top 35% to 50% of their high school class. Median test scores are in the 573 to 619 range on the SAT and from 24 to 26 on the ACT. These schools generally accept between one half and three quarters of their applicants.

### Competitive

This category is a broad one covering colleges that generally have median freshman test scores between 500 and 572 on the SAT and between 21 and 23 on the ACT. Some of these colleges require that students have high school averages of B- or better, although some state a minimum of C+ or C. Generally, these colleges prefer students in the top 50% to 65% of their graduating class and they accept between 75% and 85% of their applicants.

### Less Competitive

Included in this category are colleges with median freshman test scores below 500 on the SAT and below 21 on the ACT. These colleges admit students with averages generally below C who rank in the top 65% of their graduating class. These colleges admit 85% or more of their applicants.

### Non Competitive

These colleges require that students provide evidence of graduation from an accredited high school. Entrance exams are required for placement purposes.

### Special

These are colleges whose programs are specialized; professional schools of art or music, nursing, or other specific disciplines. The admissions criteria is not based primarily on academics but on evidence of talent or interest.
